October 2nd, Saginaw Valley Chapter of the Michigan Archaeological Society, Saginaw

The Michigan Archaeological Society will be working at a historical period archaeological site near Laingsburg, Michigan Saturday October 11th 10am-4pm. We plan to have units open over a 19th century sheet midden which has been identified by Lansing Community College field school students. There will also be some magnetic susceptibility survey taking place in other portions of the property. Be sure to bring your own pair of work gloves and plenty of water. There are a few places to get lunch in Laingsburg (a mile away if you leave your lunch at home), however, we will plan to take lunches in the field at the worksite. It is highly recommended that you wear closed-toed shoes and long pants. Please refrain from wearing very loose jewelry, shorts, and sandals. We will be meeting at 9860 Woodbury Rd. You can park along (off to the side of) the next driveway to the south.
