Planning Commission members include: Dave Osier (chair), Bill McDonald, Terry Kryshak (council representative), Kevin Nyquist, and Louis Miskovich.

The commission spent a significant part of the year reviewing and adopting various plans and reviewing and making suggestions for zoning changes. The commission helped make great strides towards assisting the city in becoming Redevelopment Ready Community certified.

Each meeting started with a discussion of relevant articles to learn more various topics. Each member received training on the roles and responsibilities of Planning Commission members including the open meetings act.

Meeting dates and summaries

January 3rd, 2018

Training on the roles and responsibilities of the Planning Commission. A discussion on the plans and goals for the commission.

February 6th, 2018

Discussed changes to the zoning ordinance including bicycle parking, street trees, parking lot landscaping, accessory dwelling units and tiny houses, and the Central Business District Overlay.

March 6th, 2018

Continued discussion on changes to the zoning ordinanc.

April 2nd, 2018

Hosted a public hearing on the Capital Improvement Plan and discussed it. Continued discussion on zoning changes. Discussed the Public Participation Plan. Discussed changing the zoning code to require medical marijuana be regulated as a home occupation.

May 1st, 2018

Hosted Public Hearings and further discussed the Capital Improvement Plan, Zoning Amendments, and the Public Participation Plan. Started discussion on the Marketing Plan. Adopted the Capital Improvement Plan and the Public Participation Plan, and recommended the council adopt the Zoning Amendments.

June 5th, 2018

Hosted a public hearing on the marketing plan and adopted it. Recommended the Council adopt the Zoning Amendments with some changes.

August 7th, 2018

Discussed the Parks and Recreation Plan. Discussed the RRC process.

September 5th, 2018

Discussed the lighting ordinance changes and started brainstorming potential brownfields in Bessemer.

October 2nd, 2018

Hosted a public hearing and adopted the Parks and Recreation Plan. Hosted a public hearing on the lighting ordinance and recommended the council adopt it. Continued to brainstorm potential brownfield sites.

Each meeting started with a discussion of relevant articles to learn more various topics. Each member received training on the roles and responsibilities of DDA members including the open meetings act.

January 9th, 2018

Discussed banners for US-2, trees to purchase for Ethnic Commons, bicycle racks, and a winter festival. Spent considerable time discussing the plans for 2018. Accepted the annual report. Discussed the Vittone building purchase.

February 13th, 2018

Worked with Advocate Counseling to extend their PopUp shop funding not to exceed the total \$3,500. Discussed the welcome signs and banners. Adjusted the PopUp shop reimbursement program.

March 12, 2018

Discussed trees in Ethnic Common's park, banners, and welcome signs. Discussed the Christmas tree meter.

April 12th, 2018

Approved PopUp Shop funding for the Yellow Umbrella and Saari's Rustic Furniture. Purchased banners for US-2. Purchased new trees for the Ethnic Commons. Allowed Staff to apply for the First Impression's grant. Authorized staff to send letter to businesses explaining opportunities.

May 10th, 2018

Provided façade improvement funds to Sarah Pope, Bessemer Small Engines, and Tacconelli's. Gave staff permission to apply for a marketing grant. Took on the cost of the Christmas light.

June 14th, 2018

Provided façade improvement funds to Whitburn properties. Provided PopUp Shop funding to Platinum Dance Studios. Accepted Coleman's proposal to update welcome signs.

July 5th, 2018 Special meeting

Met to discuss whether to purchase 221 S Sophie. Decided to let it go up for the first auction.

Capital Improvements Plan

A Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) is a multi-year planning instrument used to identify needs and financing sources for public infrastructure improvements. The purpose of a CIP is to facilitate the orderly planning of infrastructure improvements; to maintain, preserve, and protect the community of Bessemer's existing Infrastructure system; and to provide for the acquisition or scheduled replacement of equipment to ensure the efficient delivery of services to the community. The CIP is also utilized to ensure that capital improvements are fiscally sound and consistent with the goals and policies of the governing body and the residents of the community.

A comprehensive CIP is an essential tool for the planning and development of the social, physical, and economic wellbeing of the community. This process is a necessary step in an organized effort to strengthen the quality of public facilities and services; provide a framework for the realization of community goals and objectives; and provide a sound basis on which to build a healthy and vibrant community.

The CIP informs Bessemer residents and stakeholders on how the municipality plans to address significant capital needs over the next six years. The CIP provides visual representations of the community's needs including maps that detail the timing, sequence, and location of capital projects. The CIP can also influence growth because infrastructure can impact development patterns.

Some of the many benefits that the CIP provides for the residents and stakeholders include:

- Optimize the uses of revenue
- Focus attention on community goals, needs, and capabilities
- Guide future growth and development
- Encourage efficient government
- Improve intergovernmental and regional cooperation
- Help maintain a sound and stable financial program
- Enhance opportunities for the participation in federal and/or state grant programs

The projects identified in the CIP represent the community's plan to serve residents and anticipate the needs of a dynamic community. Projects are guided by various development plans and policies established by City Council and administration. Plans and policies include: Zoning Ordinance, Master Plan, Downtown Development Authority Plan, and the Sewer and Water Plan.
